# MIR Centre for Peace MIR Centre for Peace

September 21, 2007 (International Peace Day) was the grand opening of the Mir Centre for Peace at Selkirk College. Mir is the Russian word for peace... and also 'the world.' The college now has a "Peace Studies" program available through the college and the Mir Centre.

The vision for the Mir Centre is to bring together people for discussion, education and reflection on how to create 'cultures of peace' that will transform our world.

The Mir Centre is built on land that was inhabited by First Nations people and then the Doukhobors. The creators of the centre are attempting to blend important concepts for peace and reconciliation from these traditions as they create the centre.

The centre is housed in an old Doukhobor communal home. Each brick is from the original building. All the bricks were removed, cleaned and then reused in the renovated building. A beautiful metaphor of taking the crumbling pieces of the past and constructing something beautiful with them

After the afternoon events at the Mir. many members of the community attended a presentation by Stephen Lewis on "Human Rights, Social Justice and Communities of Peace".




























#### Pointers for canoeing:

friends from other countries.






and cadets and the children in pink. We just followed that line and went to the memorial.



#### "GOING AND SOULING --HALLOWEEN DAY"

#### **Origins of Halloween**

Halloween was started by ancient Celts who lived 2000 years ago in the area



that is now the United Kingdom and northern France. Originally it was a celebration of



their New Year what started from Nov 1st. Celts The believed that this day was the end of summer and the beginning of harvest. It is also а time associated with death because the days started to be colder

and darker and the crops finished. Also they believed that the night before the New Year, the boundary between death and life became blurred, so the souls of the dead returned to earth, and caused disease and damaged crops. Thus they started this celebration to prevent the destruction, and this celebration was festival of Samhain (pronounced sow-in). These are the origins of Halloween.

By 43 A.D., the Romans had conquered the territory of the Celts and ruled for about 200



years. As a result, the traditional festival of Samhain was combined with two Roman festivals. One of Roman festival was Feralia that is a traditional celebration of the dead. The second was a day to honor Pomona,



Roman the goddess fruit and trees. By 800 AD, the influence of Christianity had spread to the land of the Celts, and the century, Pope Boniface designated Nov. 1<sup>st</sup> as All Saints' Day and

sometimes called All-hallows or All-hallowmas. The night before All Saints' Day, the night of Samhain began to be called All-Hallows-Eve, and eventually, Halloween. By 1000 AD the church made a Nov 2<sup>nd</sup>, All Souls'Day, a day to honor the dead. It was





similar to Samhain. Finally, together these three days joined to create Halloween.

#### Trick-or-Treating.

"Trick-or-Treating" dates back to the All-Souls' day parade in England. During the



festival, poor citizens would beg for food, and families would give them pastries called "Soul cakes". It was a symbol that they promised to pray for the family's dead relatives. The distribution of "Soul cakes" was a good way to replace the ancient custom of leaving food for roaming spirits. This custom which was referred to as a "Going-a-Souling" was eventually taken up by children who visited the houses in their neighborhood and were given ale, food and money.

#### Costumes

The tradition of dressing up in



costumes finds roots in both European and Celtic traditions. Hundreds years ago, winter was an uncertain and unfortunate time. Because people were afraid of the dark, and the short days in winter gave

them constant worry. They thought that at night souls came to earth and they didn't want to loose their soul. So, when night time came they wore masks and animal's skins to



avoid being recognized by these souls. On Halloween to keep the souls away from the house, people left bowls of food outside to appease the spirits and prevent them attempting to enter.

#### **New Experience of Halloween**

It was definitely the first time to celebrate Halloween Day, and might be the



last time, if I can't go abroad again.


hiking, you must not forget to bring a long Tshirt or jumper because the temperature in the mountain is different than lower down.


partner, we organized meetings once a week at a specific time. We are able to meet our partners at lunch or other free time and at a place that was mutually convenient, but only a public place.










## Two Visitors from China to Selkirk College



NHL." I think everybody told me, "that is impossible", but I think if you really want to do something you can do it.








#### **Christmas Tree Decorations** By Claudie-Anne Fortin
