2023 STUDENT ENGAGEMENT SURVEY

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About the Respondents

Out of a possible 2,096 students who attended Selkirk College in the Winter 2023 semester, 1,132 students responded to the 2023 Student Engagement Survey for a response rate of 54%. In 2022, the response rate was 51%.

The majority of students who took the survey were:

on the Castlegar campus (48%) between the ages of 22 and 30 (37%) studying full-time (86%) domestic students (72%) working full-time before attending Selkirk (44%)

83% of students said that Selkirk College was their first choice, representing a decrease from 2022 (90%); however, 87% said that if they could start over they would still choose Selkirk for their education.

The most common reasons domestic students chose to attend Selkirk was because Selkirk is close to home (63%), the program/course selection (48%), and the affordable tuition (44%). For international students, the most common reasons for choosing to attend Selkirk was the affordable tuition (55%), program/course selection (53%), and applied learning opportunities (34%).

The Selkirk College website was the top tool used to help domestic students make the decision to attend (38%). For international students, an international agent was the most common tool used in deciding to attend Selkirk (41%).

Aspects of Interaction with Faculty*

91% of students said they often worked hard to meet their instructor's expectations, which is in line with respondents from 2022. 84% of students felt encouraged and supported by their instructor(s) to meet their goals. 73% of students said they had received timely and meaningful feedback on their academic performance. While only 45% of students said they discussed grades or assignments with an instructor, this is an increase of 13% from 2022.

Aspects of Educational Experience*

0 of the 12 indicators have met the 90% threshold that the Ministry of Education sets for Quality of Education. While students are still overall satisfied with their educational experience, and many indicators came close to the threshold, all 12 indicators fall below the 90% threshold.

The areas that fall below the 90% (below 89%) benchmark and therefore require additional attention are:

87% satisifaction with the amount of knowledge that I have gained

86% satisfaction with availability of instructors to provide support

84% satisfaction with the quality of course content

84% satisfaction with quality of instruction

84% satisfaction with the clarity of course objectives

79% satisfaction with fairness of exams and assessments

77% satisfaction with the amount of work required to do well

72% satisfaction with the quality of textbooks and other learning resources

66% satisfaction with the ability to learn through online/remote/blended

Aspects of Active and Collaborative Learning*

Students were asked how often they engaged in five areas of active and collaborative learning.

77% worked together with classmates on assignments, projects, or coursework

74% discussed ideas from class with others outside of class

72% asked questions in class or contributed to a class discussion

70% connected ideas or concepts from different courses

61% expressed their individual point of view during class discussions

55% included diverse perspectives in course discussions or assignments

Challenges to Academic Success*

The most common challenge facing students during this year was balancing family/personal obligations, 44% of students in total. Close behind, at 43%, is the challenge students identified with their mental health. For domestic students, other major challenges were keeping themselves motivated (43%), managing their finances (36%), physical health (32%) and heavy course load (31%). For international students, other major challenges included balancing work obligations (36%), managing their finances (35%), transportation to/from school (33%), keeping themselves motivated (31%).

Tuition Fees*

Student satisfaction with Selkirk's tuition fees has increased slightly from 2022 levels. Students are 65% satisfied with the comparability of Selkirk's tuition fees to other colleges, compared to 64% in 2022, and 70% in 2021. Satisfaction with the affordability of Selkirk's tuition fees increased to 62%, up slighlty from 60% in 2022. Affordability of post-secondary education remained constant with 2022 at 50%, but decreased from 2021 (56%).

Personal savings still shows as the main source of funding for students, consistent with 2022 (48%) but a decrease compared to 53% in 2021. The results also show an increase in students using government student grants/loans (30%), part-time employment (29%), and scholarships or bursaries (21%) for their funding. There was a small decrease in students using direct support from family. The percentage of students using full-time employment while studying (6%) increased 2% from 2022. Most other areas remained constant.

In 2023, students were asked if they had expererienced any financial stress this year.

34% said they can manage their finances

32% worry regularly about how to pay tuition fees and living costs

14% chose none of the options

6% reduced their course load to pay for education and living expenses

5% might need to abandon studies at Selkirk College due to financial reasons


