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Afternoon Workshops/ Please select one:

A. Web Standards & Open Source Technologies, Charla Beaulieu & Jason Taylor

Charla explores the importance of current standards in web development and showcase DA 131 Introduction to Web Standards, Accessibility, XHTML and CSS, which is offered as an online Transitions course. Jason leads an open discussion on how to keep current in the digital media world using open source software, hardware and how open source can change the way we teach and learn.

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B. The Cultures of Peace, Myler and Linda Wilkinson

Join Myler and Linda for stories of peace and social justice in the Kootenay region, most specifically telling of the Mir Centre for Peace as a regional resource. Participate in an activity on "understanding and building cultures of peace" that you can use with your students.

E. Science Lab: Mushrooms & Toadstools, Rob Macrae

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F. Shop Time, Ross White & Michael Grace

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G. What do you Need to Succeed in Calculus?, John Stegman

Analyze a diagnostic test which John gives to Calculus student at the beginning of the course to show students their strengths and weaknesses in algebra ad trigonometry. John believes that you need almost ALL you learned in high school to succeed In Calculus.

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H. Introduction to Moodle, Judy McIvor & Lori Bakken

Moving towards a virtual classroom raises multiple questions for the teachers and learners alike. Come and see a Moodle classroom from both the student and teacher perspectives and ask your questions relating to pedagogy, design and technical requirements surrounding online learning.

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I.Preparing Students for the Academic Demands of College and University, Todd Solarik

Examine common learning difficulties many of our students encounter especially during their first year at college. Todd shares learning and study skills teachers and instructors use to help their students in high school and to prepare students for the transition to college. Some familiar myths students have towards learning will also be discussed/debunked.

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J. Jewellery Studio: The Creative Process: Producing Jewellery with Paper, Pauline Dupas

Create jewellery pieces that are entirely fabricated by hand. This 3 hour workshop is at Kootenay School of the Arts at Selkirk College.

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K. Clay Studio

Take part in hand building exercises - simple, fun and engaging! You will take away a piece of art as well as techniques to use with your students. This 3 hour workshop is at Kootenay School of the Arts at Selkirk College.

L. Metal Studio: Introduction to Blacksmithing, Kevin Kratz

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This 3 hour workshop is at Kootenay School of the Arts at Selkirk College.

M. Found Image and Object Composition, Courtney Andersen

Combine found images, paint, texturing material, and objects (anything from pieces of wood to objects which had former uses) to make compositions on scrap plywood. Some scrap plywood and the texturing material will be provided. You may bring in larger format plywood or other surfaces such as wooden boxes, etc. Learn how to make and apply ancient wax medium (cerra-cola). Acrylic paints and brushes are to be provided by participants.

N. A Writer & Anthropologist Walk in the Classroom: Making sense of your world in stories, *Lori Barkley & Almeda Glenn Miller*

Learn how and why personal stories act as a bridge to convey course content, making it more student-centered and thus better engaging students in their learning process through storytelling. Lori will look at ethnography, emphasizing its ordinariness as a common tool in sense-making of the world around us. <u>back to workshops</u>

O. Facilitated Discussion as a Way of Teaching, Lorill Harding & Ruth DuBois

Ruth and Lorill share key points and benefits of discussion as a way of teaching. You will learn strategies to facilitate discussion and explore some of the strengths such as recognizing and investigating assumptions and identifying different perspectives of an issue.

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
