Steve Bareham • Selkirk College • Making Critical Thinking Skills Relevant to Gen Y

Steve came to Selkirk College in 1996, after working as a print journalist and editor at several Canadian daily newspapers, and in communications positions at TransAlta, Simon Fraser University, and the B.C. School Trustees Association. He teaches business and cross cultural communications and marketing and is the administrator of the Golf Club Operations Program. He has written nine education-related books through publishers such as Harper Collins and McGraw-Hill Ryerson, including The Business of Thinking: Helping Employees Think Better, portions of which are studied by the College's resort/hotel and ski management students. Steve's pedagogical thesis is that thinking skills should be taught explicitly, as is done with languages and sciences - yet, how often does this happen, and how can educators make thinking relevant and interesting to young adults?

She has attended multiple United Nations Climate Change Conferences, co-founded the Canadian Youth Climate Coalition, and was aboard the Students On Ice Expeditions to Antarctica and the Arctic.
