CD Celebrates 20 Years of Music at Selkirk College

The faculty of the Selkirk College Contemporary Music and Technology program has released its first album in its 20 year history—*Souvenir*.

Produced by Don Macdonald and recorded by Steven Parish, the album celebrates 20 years of music instruction at Selkirk College. Performers include: Cheryl Hodge, Darren Mahe, Kiyo Elkuf, Mark Spielman, Glenn Mitchell, Paul Landsberg, Laura Landsberg, Gilles Parenteau, Don Macdonald and Steven Parish. Proceeds from the sale of the album will go towards a music scholarship that will be available to students enrolled in the program.

By combining a classic rhythm section of bass, drums, guitar and keys with vocals and horns, *Souvenir* covers classics such as the Beatles'"Come Together", Jeff Beck's "You Know What I Mean" and Chick Corea's "Sea Journey". Original compositions showcase the stylistic range of this multitalented troupe in genres including uptempo modal jazz, rock and roll, funk and soulful blues.

"We love to play and we hope it shows," says Composition Instructor, Don Macdonald. "We wanted a way to showcase the talents of our faculty, assist our students, and mark the 20th anniversary of the Contemporary Music and Technology program at the college. This seemed like a natural way to cover all of our bases."

Activist Builds on Nursing's Privilege and Potential

A mother of two growing boys and newly divorced, Trista Ling decided it was time to go back to school and pursue her dream of becoming a doctor. She had always wanted to go to medical school, but life had gotten in the way and she hadn't been able to realize that goal. But when she mentioned her plans to her family doctor, she recommended that Ling take a look at nursing instead—she would graduate faster, have a more reasonable schedule and get to spend time with her kids. Ling took that advice and hasn't looked back since: "Nursing is just so much more me. I would rather be in the role of walking beside people through their health issues than leading the way for them."

She enrolled at Selkirk College, in Castlegar, BC, which offers a fouryear baccalaureate degree in nursing with the University of Victoria. Although she's been a graduate for just a year, Ling has already obtained her perianesthesia nursing certificate and has been working in the post-anesthetic recovery unit at her local hospital.

DISTINGUISHED ALUMNUS AWARD

A proposal creating the Distinguished Alumnus Award was approved by the Selkirk College Board of Governors on November 24, 2009. Beginning in 2010, one award will be presented annually to a former Selkirk College student whose work reflects well on Selkirk College and has led to outstanding achievements in his or her field of endeavor.

NURSING PROGRAM

2009 Selkirk Nursing graduates Marieke Hiensch and Jessica Nilsen were honoured by being two of the four keynote speakers at Vancouver's Human Rights and Diversity Conference last November. Organized by the BC Nurses Union, the conference was attended by more than 150 nurses affiliated with the union.

Further afield, 2008 Nursing alumni Cailey Lynch is volunteering to be a guest nursing instructor in Bangladesh this winter. The International University of Business, Agriculture & Technology, in the city of Dhaka, asked Cailey to teach students in the Baccalaureate Nursing Program. The university opened its doors only four years ago with the assistance of a small Canadian NGO called Mid-Main Friends of Bangladesh.

\$7M FUNDS SELKIRK COLLEGE STUDENT RESIDENCE UPGRADE

A \$6.9 million investment from the federal and provincial governments will create affordable student housing at Selkirk College. The project will upgrade an unused building on Selkirk's Tenth Street Campus. Boundary-Similkameen MLA John Slater and Okanagan-Shuswap MP Colin Mayes made the announcement in November 2009.

"This is a great day for Selkirk College. The upgrading of this building will create local jobs and help relieve the acute affordable housing shortages for students," said Slater.

The Columbia Basin Trust (CBT) has also committed to a financial contribution of \$100,000 and the City of Nelson has contributed the land and building.

The project involves upgrading the structure to current building standards, with the ultimate goal of LEED certification and

developing solar, geothermal and micro hydro energy sources.

The residence, built 50 years ago but unused for the last six, will help Selkirk College in the recruitment and retention of students while also increasing the availability of affordable housing off-campus for non-students in the community. Once the project is complete, approximately 100 students will live in the 2- or 3-bedroom units.

SELKIRK STAFF STUDENT EMERGENCY FUND



In April of 2009, Maintenance staff member, Tom Cotton, approached the Development Department and asked if there was any way he could help the students at Selkirk College have an easier life while at college.

After considering several options Tom decided the best way to assist the students was to help fill the food banks and make sure emergency funds were available for students in need.

Tom couldn't do it by himself however, so he enlisted the help of his fellow employees and the Selkirk Staff Student Emergency Fund was born. It is commonly known around the college as the SSSEF.

Since June of 2009, Tom has signed up 44 staff members on a regular payroll deduction program and has collected five one time donations. All funds go directly to the students through food bank donations, grocery cards and emergency funds.

On behalf of Selkirk College and students, we would like to thank Tom for initiating the fund and to all staff and donors who have contributed to it.

Selkirk College C-Level Welding Graduate Builds Successful Sculpture Business



Kate Tupper is a welder turned artist who was born and raised in Nakusp, BC. For several years, she has been simultaneously building her art practice and her business, Spark Tart Designs. Tupper's work is individual and intriguing and one thing's for sure, she wields a wicked welding torch.

Her interest in metalwork began in high school shop classes. "At first I was not impressed because it was noisy and dirty," states Tupper, "but I love to build things and found steel to be such an amazing medium, that soon I was won over and came to love it."

When faced with the monumental decision of choosing a career path, Kate decided welding would be a good option for her. It would build on her metalworking interest and allow her to remain living in the West Kootenay, which was a priority. She graduated from Selkirk College's C-Level welding in 2004 and since then has been working in the area as a fabrication welder.

Kate's life has had its share of challenges. She was a mother of two before age 20, trying to finish high school, and then subsequently

went to college. She then had to prove she had the skills and determination to work in a male dominated industry. Nevertheless, she has soldiered through this to build a successful career doing something she loves.

Attending Selkirk College helped contribute to her success. "Selkirk College made sure my welding was solid," Tupper says, "to be a female tradesperson you have to always be on top of your game. If I hadn't attended Selkirk, my point of view as an artist and my practical skill level would be entirely different."

Kate's mind is always milling with a continuous clutter of conceptions for metal masterpieces. She thrives on challenge and cannot refuse an opportunity to be creative. Her work definitely has its own style, with production pieces such as the quirky best-selling "Honkey-Tonk Angels" (a decorative piece for the home created from old horseshoes and steel) and her steel sculptures of life-size antique furniture. She is also kept busy doing custom commission work,


like building a headboard out of bike parts for some cycle-crazy comrades.

Considering the amount of artists in the area who also produce steel sculpture, Kate has been driven to experiment and come at the medium in a more memorable manner. Her main goal is to hear people say "Wow, I've never seen anything like that before!"

In the future, Kate plans to leave her fabricating roots behind to focus on Spark Tart Design and her artwork. She plans to continue living in Nakusp and growing her business throughout the Kootenays, working odd jobs as the need arises, but hoping to eventually live solely off her sculpture. Certainly, we can expect to see more of this innovative artist's work in local galleries, businesses and public spaces.

Alumni Profile: Chris Habib

• Where are you from, originally?

I am from Truro, Nova Scotia.

• How did you find out about Selkirk's Aviation program?

I worked full-time at the Nova Scotia liquor corporation while I was at university. My co-worker's father was a retired Air Canada pilot and he recommended Selkirk College. His nephew graduated from Selkirk and now has a successful career at WestJet.

• What is your current position with Cathay Pacific and what are you responsible for?

I am a Cadet Second Officer. I'll be a cadet for 14 months while I train in Australia.

Once I'm done training, I become a second officer. I'll be responsible for relieving the captain and first officer while they rest on long haul flights such as Hong Kong to Vancouver. As a second officer, I monitor the controls and radios, but am not permitted to control, take-off or land the aircraft.

• What was the hiring process like?

Long, tiring and exciting. The process had many stages. It began by applying online. If successful you are invited to an interview and three preliminary tests—an English test, reasoning test, and a quiz based on a booklet they send you. The interview and tests take place in the city closest to where Cathay flies in and out of. In my case it was Vancouver.

If you are successful in stage 1 they invite you to Hong Kong for stages 2 and possibly 3. Cathay takes care of the flight and hotel accommodation. Stage 2 is another interview with several other written and group exercises. If successful, stage 3 is a management interview, a medical exam and an English proficiency check.

Stage 4 is a two week flight grading in Adelaide, Australia. For me, the flight grading consisted of three flights and three simulator exercises to judge my learning ability, personality, and attitude.

• How did your training and education at the college prepare you for this position?

Without Selkirk's great teaching staff and structured flight program, I would not have had the confidence to apply for this position, let alone succeed in getting the job. The school's instructors and work ethic pushes students. They show you what it means to work hard and it prepares you for the future.

• What are your future plans with the company?

My goal right now is to work as hard as I can until I become a senior Captain. Once I achieve that I will set another goal and keep shooting higher.



• Would you recommend Selkirk to other potential commercial pilots?

I would definitely recommend Selkirk to other potential commercial pilots for the reasons I've mentioned already and also because flying in the mountains is very difficult. You have to be prepared and

confident in your skills while at Selkirk. The instructors test your abilities and encourage you to do more. The facilities are in great shape and the new simulator (the ALSIM) is priceless. When you're not busy flying you will be busy preparing for your simulator exercises or studying for the week's assignments and tests. Like I said, they prepare you for everything. The small class size allows for an intimate learning experience where every student

receives appropriate guidance. Also, the Kootenay landscape is beautiful. You'll have fun just flying throughout the area!

• Other comments or experiences you would like to share?

I have been so busy preparing for my move to Australia that I have probably forgotten other great things about the school. One of my regrets is that I will not be able to graduate with my classmates in May. They are a great group of people and I know we will all be successful in our endeavours. I would like to give a special thanks to the Chief Flying Instructor at Selkirk, Ray Preston. His knowledge, advice and teaching are something I will never forget as a pilot.
